Background — John 13:33, 14:1-18: In John's Gospel, the account i given concerning <i>"another Comforter" (John 14:16),</i> and two grea truths are quickly seen:	
1. By the use of the word <i>"another,"</i> the Lord Jesus implied that <i>"HE"</i> is the <i>other</i> Comforter.	d
2. By the use of the word <i>"another,"</i> the Lord Jesus is acting as that Comforter by relating to the disciples that He will provide them with comfort, even in His absence (While He is unveiling this truth, He is fulfilling it!)	

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NOTES	There is an additional revelation in this truth of <i>another Comforter</i> that carries a two-fold significance:
	 Another of the same kind. Another of a different kind.
	Which is it?
	The word has a root meaning <i>"in the same likeness"</i> , or <i>"mirror image."</i> It does not mean <i>"unique,"</i> which could be interpreted <i>"another."</i> The context as well as the etymology clarifies this great truth. He who comforts will comfort, whether present or absent. He will comfort! Now that is a Comforter, and that is a comfort! (<i>Acts 9:31, 2 Corinthians 1:4</i>)
	The word for comfortless means ⁽¹⁸⁾ or ⁽¹⁹⁾ (John 14:18) It is also
	translated ⁽²⁰⁾ The promise itself was of great comfort. The Lord Jesus was leaving, but He was not leaving them alone! He was providing One who would be as He, and continue in His absence. They would not become <i>orphans</i> .
	Illustration: Identical twins – inseparable characteristics.
	When Jesus made the promise, He was mindful of His departure. And He certainly had ⁽²¹⁾ in view. But, He was also mindful of "another Comforter," for He also had ⁽²²⁾ in view! The disciples certainly evidenced the fulfillment of this great promise in Acts 9:31. They ministered in the ⁽²³⁾ of the Holy Ghost, and they were mindful of His presence and His encouragement in their trials. He is The Comforter. (2 Corinthians 1:3-7)
	The Greek word ⁽²⁴⁾ , He is "the counsel for the defense." The word rendered ⁽²⁵⁾ (1 John 2:1) was used by John through the Holy Spirit to identify Christ as our intercessor in heaven, then used by the Lord to describe Himself while on earth. (<i>Luke 22:31-32</i>)

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NOTES	Herbert Lockyear reminds us of the qualifications of <i>"he who ever lives to make intercessions for us."</i> (<i>Hebrews 7:25</i>)
	 1. He must be wise in the ways of the court of judicature – our heavenly advocate most certainly is. (<i>Colossians 2:3</i>)
	2. He must belong to the Law, which is the rule for Him to practice—Christ satisfied the law for us by His death (<i>Galatians 3:13, 4:4</i>) and likewise fulfilled the Law for us by His obedience. (<i>Romans 5:19</i>)
	3. He must have the judge's ear more than others, having full authority to speak, which Jesus has. (<i>John 11:42</i>) The ground of His pleading is Calvary, which gives Him prevailing power with the judge of all the earth.
	4. He must be careful to keep up the honor of the judge, to prevent any contempt of court. In His high-priestly prayer of John 17, our heavenly advocate illustrated this in truth.
	Because of all they are in themselves, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit are alone qualified to intercede in and for us, and they are our only intercessors (<i>1 Timothy 2:5</i>).
	We have only one ⁽³²⁾ in the presence of God, <i>"the Lord Jesus Christ"</i> , and the Father listens intently for our plea presented on our behalf by the Advocate above inspired by the Advocate below.
	 We have one who ever lives to make intercessions for us. He is alongside those who are called ⁽³³⁾ Consoling the troubled heart by guiding us in <i>"truth"</i> through God's Word. (<i>John 14:2</i>) In His absence, we find instead of sorrow or abandonment, <i>"another Comforter."</i> (<i>John 16:7</i>)

3. By being ⁽⁴⁰⁾ when we are hurting. (1 <i>Corinthians</i> 1:3-7)	
He stays with the believer as Counselor, Consoler, Comforter, Companion, and Council, speaking to us, through us, and for us so we will never again be alone or be unable. What a comfort!
