Asah (aw-saw') "MAKER"

"For thy Maker is thine husband; the LORD of hosts is His name; and thy Redeemer the Holy One of Israel; The God of the whole earth shall he be called." ~Isaiah 54:5

⁽¹⁾ describes God as ⁽²⁾ . In the first	
two chapters of Genesis, ⁽³⁾ is used ⁽⁴⁾ times	NOTES
in connection with God's creative power, and its most frequent	
usage occurs in Deuteronomy and Psalms.	
(Note: Psalms 68 uses the reference 26 times.)	
This term speaks of God's ability to ⁽⁵⁾ From	
that ability and might comes the term that means "to swear by".	
"Elohim" speaks of all that God is and can accomplish, and when	
God wanted man to know of a surety that God cannot fail, He	
revealed Himself by name as well as by testimony to His works.	
When calling on man to ⁽⁶⁾ Him, God revealed Who	
He was and <i>"covenanted"</i> or promised the people that He is the	
mighty God of creation. To prove His promise, He swore by	
Himself (<i>Hebrews 6:13</i>), for no more sure word of promise could	
be given.	
Elohim created all things (the Trinity in action) by a divine act of	
God's will and in a unique fashion we call (7)	
Exnihilo by definition is to create something from nothing; a new	
thing. The divine act of creating – not fashioning or refashioning,	
but literally to create.	
The root for ⁽⁸⁾ is ⁽⁹⁾ , from which we	
get " <i>abr-aw</i> " to create, to form a new thing.	
From the root ⁽¹⁰⁾ , we find the concept of	
⁽¹¹⁾ , or transform, to mold or shape. In some cases	
these words are exchanged and only by the context can you	
clearly determine the intent of the usage.

NOTES	Both acts are significant actions on the part of God, not men. God is Elohim - Creator, but God is also ASAH - Maker. Not only does God create, but God sustains. God is not finished with creation, but rather God is active in shaping and conforming creation to His divine will.
	When we see our God as ⁽¹²⁾ , we must see Him as "the One who shapes our lives", not just the One who shaped us. As ⁽¹³⁾ , our God is ⁽¹⁴⁾ us, or perhaps more appropriately, ⁽¹⁵⁾ us. Our God is ASAH, and He "hath done marvelous things." (Psalm 98:1, 95:5-6, 139:1)
	Illustration: The potter, clay, potter's wheel. (<i>Jeremiah 18:2-6; Psalm 2:9; Isaiah 29:6; 1 Chronicles 4:23; Isaiah 30:14</i>) We are to be pliable, workable, moldable, shapeable, for we are truly " <i>His workmanship</i> " (<i>Ephesians 2:10</i>)
	God is our Creator. We have not formed ourselves, and God is our Maker. We cannot transform ourselves! Without Him we can do nothing.
	The Bible uses these references throughout speaking of God's divine presence and His divine intervention in our daily lives.
	 God said I will make thee God maketh thee to do Our God hath made thee to understand Have not I brought thee out And I give unto them

Asah

Man rebels against the God of creation, and thus man rebels against the God of re-creation. *"A new man in Christ" (2 Corinthians 5:17)* speaks of a reshaping or transforming, and involves ASAH, our Maker, who shall shape us according as we allow.

ASAH speaks of a very active work of God among His creation, not what has been done, but what can be done as we yield ourselves as clay in the Potter's hand.

God is working all things according to His divine will. (*Hebrews* 13:21; *Ephesians* 1:19, 4:16)

Thank God that He is working! He is making us to be like Him! (*Romans 8:29*)
