(ALE SHAD-DAH' -EE)
"GOD ALMIGHTY"

*"... the LORD appeared to Abram, and said unto him,
I am the Almighty God; walk before me, and be thou perfect."
~Genesis 17:1*

El-Shaddai means ⁽¹⁾ _____, and is first revealed to Abram in Genesis 17:1.

This same title was used when God appeared to ⁽²⁾ _____ and to ⁽³⁾ _____ to bless them. ⁽⁴⁾ _____, He in whom all fullness dwells, has the constant fullness (supply) to provide all things for His own.

⁽⁵⁾ _____ occurs ⁽⁶⁾ _____ times in the Old Testament. ⁽⁷⁾ _____, translated ⁽⁸⁾ _____, is found ⁽⁹⁾ _____ times in Job, and ⁽¹⁰⁾ _____ times elsewhere in the Old Testament.

There are equivalent expressions found at least ⁽¹¹⁾ _____ times in the New Testament.

Examples:

Lord Almighty (*2 Corinthians 6:18*)

The Almighty (*Revelation 1:8*)

Lord God Almighty (*Revelation 4:8*)

God Almighty (*Revelation 16:14*)

Lord God Omnipotent (*Revelation 19:6*)

In the New Testament, Paul refers to Christ, who said, "All power is given unto me", speaking of ⁽¹²⁾ _____ and ⁽¹³⁾ "_____." (*Ephesians 1:19, 6:10*) These New Testament references convey the message of "All powerful, the absolute sovereign." ⁽¹⁴⁾ _____ is used about ⁽¹⁵⁾ _____ times, and is applied only to ⁽¹⁶⁾ _____.

NOTES

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In our first study we saw ⁽¹⁷⁾ _____ as the root word for ⁽¹⁸⁾ _____, and we defined ⁽¹⁹⁾ _____ as ⁽²⁰⁾ _____ in creation and before creation.

⁽²¹⁾ _____ means ⁽²²⁾ _____, ⁽²³⁾ _____, or ⁽²⁴⁾ _____.

Over ⁽²⁵⁾ _____ times ⁽²⁶⁾ _____ is translated ⁽²⁷⁾ _____ of ⁽²⁸⁾ _____ and ⁽²⁹⁾ _____, sometimes referred to as the ⁽³⁰⁾ _____.

Contained within the name ⁽³¹⁾ _____, we find two descriptive titles:

I. El (Defining two distinct positions)

A. That He is ⁽³²⁾ _____.

B. That He is ⁽³³⁾ _____, sufficient in strength, the very source of all might or power, or strength. He is inclusive of might and power.

II. Shaddai (Defining the attribute associated with God that is conveyed in conjunction with El.)

We have seen that ⁽³⁴⁾ _____ defines ⁽³⁵⁾ _____ and His ⁽³⁶⁾ _____, ⁽³⁷⁾ _____, ⁽³⁸⁾ _____, and ⁽³⁹⁾ _____; but what of Shaddai?

Shaddai, as the divine title, is used ⁽⁴⁰⁾ _____ times in the Old Testament. It is prefaced by ⁽⁴¹⁾ _____ ⁽⁴²⁾ _____ times. (*Genesis 17:1, 28:3, 35:11, 43:14; Exodus 6:3; Ezekiel 10:5*) The remaining ⁽⁴³⁾ _____ times, ⁽⁴⁴⁾ _____ stands alone.
